St. Paul asked that the Lord would remove his thorn, his temptation, but God said, 'No, my grace is sufficient for you.

to choke off their Faith and they are no longer seen at Holy Mass.

Finally, we also know people who are 'cultural Catholics.'
They practice their faith as long as it is easy.

They are the seeds that germinate, but have no root.

When the heat is on, they can't take it.

When the world presses its own religion onto them -
they go along with it.

Peer pressure is no just with teens, it's SO common with
adults, who go along with whatever society teaches.

They wither and give up the faith.

St. Bernard says, 'the World rages, the Flesh is heavy,
and the Devil lays his snares;

we may have sinned gravely, we may have been caught at
times,

but as St. Bernard says, 'What sin is there so deadly
that it cannot be pardoned by the death of Christ?'

May we be - or become - those seeds which bring forth
much fruit.
